Not a breath of air, the arm looked like a sheet of glass reflecting the pale blue sky above it. We turned crosswind to the east—the engine was purring the air was incredible smooth as a baby's butt.

The Chugach mountains looked strangely majestic through the spring haze as we headed north climbing toward Palmer.

Geese were flying in chevrons over the shore near Eklutna. I thought maybe Spring is finally here.

Looking down on the Eklutna Village Russian Orthodox Church and surrounding cemetery, the graves of the villagers who have passed contrasted brightly to the late snow still laying in the shadows of the spruce trees to the south.

I could smell wood smoke burning, as the air crept around the windscreen. We spied a column of chimney smoke below us from a log house. Gray puffs drifting through the birch and spruce trees—too lazy to ascend skyward.

As we say in the trike world, "The air was fat" so dense that it was holding dust and smoke low to the ground.

Flying open cockpit over Wasilla and Palmer was glorious—almost dreamlike except for the air temperature, 28 Fahrenheit at 1,500 feet.

Looking for other aircraft traffic to the west of the Mat-Su hospital a

brightly colored globe protruding from a gravel pit to the north of the Parks Highway showed itself. Everett had the control bar up in front, I could see over his helmet what looked like a hot air balloon. Eager to see it closer we edged over to see.

Ground skimming down into the gravel pit was an orange, red, and blue checkered hot air balloon. I instructed Everett to make 90 degree turns in a box above it.

As we turned we could see two people in the basket. I recognized the balloon as one flown by Jim Rogina.

Rogina and his wife Kim are trying to revive ballooning in Alaska and have proposed a world competition here in the winter months.

After an hour and a half of flying my friend was getting a bit chilled so we headed back to Birchwood.

Over the flats to the Knik River, along the eastern banks of the Knik Arm shoreline the sun was setting to the west.

Entering the pattern you could see the Knik Arm waters reflecting Susitna, beyond it the sun was setting like an orange ball. To the Northeast the almost full moon, itself a pale shade of orange was rising between two peaks.

What a sight and what a flight.


